

D. CITIZEN COMMENTS

Mike Benedict, who handles the lot rent for Betty's Mobile Home Park, discussed the abatement letter he had received for mobile homes within the park in disrepair. He mentioned that he had demolished some homes and renovated others. He was very upset and ultimately realized during the meeting that he had misinterpreted the abatement letter believing that he had 6 days to act regarding the dilapidated homes; he was told by members of the Council that he had that amount of time to come up with an action plan. He suggested creating a city ordinance to allow skirting around the campers within the mobile home parks during the winter season. Jeff Schenk said that he would check into how other cities handle this issue. The suggestion will be addressed at the next Planning Commission meeting. Mike said the drug problems within the mobile home parks have been cleaned up over the years, and he thanked the police department for their help in getting the problem resolved.

G. **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

1. Incentive Programs for South Hutchinson Councilman Fairbanks stated there are a lot of vacant buildings currently in South Hutchinson. Per Jeff Schenk, the goal is to increase foot traffic in South Hutchinson.

2. Encumbering \$84,994.24 of ARPA money

- a. \$65,958.00 for LSSE Grant
 Per Jeff Schenk, a Grant initiated by Assistant Fire Chief Shae Brooks; used to improve communications; covers brush gear; pay up front and reimbursed 80%
- b. \$14,036.24 for Police Radios
- c. \$5,000.00 for housing assessment Partnering with Hutchinson who is allowing South Hutchinson to participate at $2\frac{1}{2}\%$
- 3. Neighborhood Revitalization Plan (NRP) with Reno County Jeff Schenk stated he will do more research with surrounding communities regarding NRP.

H. CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Per Jeff Schenk, two businesses are interested in assistance opportunities with upcoming city projects and development for South Hutchinson with which Jeff and Ronnie Pederson are both involved. Jeff would like to have a decision in December with implementation beginning in January 2024. Council members Scofield and Fairbanks offered their assistance as well.

I. GOVERNING BODY COMMENTS

Councilmember Fairbanks questioned the hiring of a new South Hutchinson police officer. Per Police Chief Darrin Pickering, the job was open for two weeks with an extension of an additional week with only 1 job applicant. Hutchinson's starting wages for police officers are higher than South Hutchinson. Per Jeff Schenk, bringing new business into South Hutchinson would in turn bring more opportunities and competitive wages. Councilman Matt Nisly suggested that Jeff work on providing a wage improvement/total package scale for and evaluate the PD & FD for efficiencies. Jeff Schenk stated he has already begun this process. Councilmember Jeremy Schmidt stated South Hutchinson needs to get away from a "copy-and-paste" budget.

Councilmember Fairbanks asked if the city's checkbook is currently balanced. Jeff Schenk reported that the books are current through May 2023, and that he is working with the CPA on this process. Jeremy Schmidt suggested that overtime should be implemented to achieve current status. According to Jeff Schenk, review by the Treasurer is being hindered by previous practices put in place and lack of knowledge during a time of job and position transition. The areas of concern, at present, involve credit cards and checks; other accounts are current. Councilmember Brislin questioned if payroll is currently correct to which Jeff Schenk replied that it is.

AGENDA ITEM: Approve ordinance 23-07 Amending Article 1 Chapter 11

BACKGROUND:

The City of South Hutchinson currently does not allow discharging a gun inside of City Limits.

The City annexed in two fields during the annexation of Agri-Center. One parcel is directly behind Kutters and the other is just north of that parcel. The farmers were told that the annexation would not affect their use of the property.

DESCRIPTION:

After being notified the farmers of those fields were frustrated because they want their crops protected from the migratory birds over the winter.

After discussion with City Council, there is a majority desire to allow the farmers to protect their crops on parcels over 40 acres and south of highway 50 by permit only. This permit will be granted by Chief of Police and

RECOMMENDATION:

City staff recommends the council approve Ordinance 23-07 "Amending Article 1 of Chapter 11 of the Code of the City of South Hutchinson" and authorize the mayor to sign.

ORDINANCE NO. 23-07

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE 1 OF CHAPTER XI OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF SOUTH HUTCHINSON, KANSAS, PERTAINING TO PUBLIC OFFENSES, TO ADD AND INCLUDE A NEW SECTION 11-104 AMENDING SECTION 10.5 OF THE UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE FOR KANSAS CITIES, AS INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE PURSUANT TO SECTION 11-101 OF SAID CODE.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of South Hutchinson, Kansas, has determined that Chapter 11, Article 1 of the Code of the City of South Hutchinson, Kansas, pertaining to public offenses should be amended by the addition of a new section 11-104.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SOUTH HUTCHINSON, KANSAS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Chapter 11, Article 1 of the City Code of the City of South Hutchinson, Kansas is hereby amended by the addition of a new section 11-104, to read as follows:

11-104. Same; amendment.

Section 10.5 of the Uniform Public Offense Code of the City of Newton, Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

10.5 Unlawful Discharge of a Firearm.

- (a) Unlawful discharge of a firearm is the reckless discharge of a firearm within or into the corporate limits of any city.
- (b) This section shall not apply to the discharge of any firearm within or into the corporate limits of the city if:
 - (1) The firearm is discharged in the lawful defense of one's person, another person or one's property;
 - (2) The firearm is discharged at a private or public shooting range;
 - (3) The firearm is discharged by authorized law enforcement officers, animal control officers or a person who has a wildlife control permit issued by the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism. A person holding a wildlife control permit must provide 24-hour advance notice to the South Hutchinson Police Department prior to the discharge of a firearm within the City;

- (4) The firearm is discharged to take a migratory bird as defined in the Migratory Bird Treaty Act by authorized law enforcement officers, animal control officers or a person who has a Migratory Bird Depredation Permit issued by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. A person holding a Migratory Bird Depredation Permit must provide 24-hour advance notice to the South Hutchinson Police Department prior to the discharge of a firearm within the City;
- (5) The firearm is discharged by special permit of the chief of police or by the sheriff when the city has no police department;
- (6) The firearm is discharged using blanks; or
- (7) The firearm is discharged in lawful self-defense or defense of another person against an animal attack.
- (c) The discharge of any firearm for the taking of wildlife within the corporate limits of the city, except as provided in (b)(3), is prohibited and shall constitute a violation of this section.
- (d) Unlawful discharge of a firearm is a Class B violation.

SECTION 2. Section 10.5 of the UPOC as adopted by Ordinance 23-03 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. All other ordinances, or parts thereof, or City policies inconsistent with Section 1 hereof, are hereby repealed and held for naught.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall be effective upon its passage and publication on the South Hutchinson City website, www.southhutch.com, the official city newspaper.

PERMIT TO HUNT MIGRATORY BIRDS WITHIN CITY LIMITS

The landowner\tenant\manager and hunter\outfitter or any hunter accompanying the outfitter listed on the permit will comply with the following:

- Obtain full licensing from the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and/or United States Fish and Wildlife Service.
- Obtain and carry an insurance liability policy (attached) on the property described above in the amount of not less than \$1,000,000.
- The dates the permit is to be used is within the season limits as set by the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and/or United States Fish and Wildlife Service.
- The number of birds/waterfowl or migratory birds harvested do not exceed the harvest limits set by the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and/or United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

- The method of taking any birds/waterfowl or migratory birds are only those allowed by the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and/or United States Fish and Wildlife Service.
- Full understanding and in full compliance with all statute, law, rule, code or regulation for the taking of birds/waterfowl migratory birds or the shooting of firearms published by the State of Kansas, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and/or United States Fish and Wildlife Service or City of Newton.
- The hunting location described above is on a parcel that is greater than 40 acres and south of highway 50 with at least one boundary being the City limit as established by the City of Hutchisons Zoning District Map.
- No firearm will be discharged within 300 feet of a residence, building, school, church, airport, cemetery, feedlot, park, recreation facility, public right-of-way or pedestrian or vehicle traffic.

I certify that I am the legal landowner, tenant or manager of the property listed above and further certify that the information provided in this document is true and accurate and that any hunter/outfitter or hunter accompanying the outfitter fully understands and will comply with the above.

• I understand that the Chief of Police may deny or revoke this permit at any time if and in his sole discretion there is a violation of any of the parameters set forth above, when there is a concern with public safety, or upon request of the City Administrator.

27-106 Accessory Uses: Buildings and structures may be erected and land may be used for purposes which are clearly incidental to, and customarily and commonly associated with the main permitted use of the premises. Such accessory buildings and uses shall be so constructed, maintained and conducted as to not produce noise, vibration, concussion, dust, dirt, fly ash, odor, noxious gases, heat or glare which is injurious, damaging, unhealthful or disturbing to adjacent property or the users thereof and shall be on the premises of the main use.

27-107 Eligibility for Accessory Use: The determination of the eligibility of a proposed use as an accessory use shall be made by the Zoning Administrator.

27-108 <u>Accessory Uses Allowed:</u> Accessory uses shall be allowed; provided, said accessory uses shall be limited to those specified herein for the various zoning classifications:

- In District "R-1A" Single-Family Residential, "R-1B" Single-Family Residential, "R-1C" Single-Family Residential, and "R-2" Two-Family Residential District, only the following accessory uses are allowed:
 - A. Accessory buildings and uses commonly associated with multi-family residential activity, including, but not limited to, the following:

Accessory off-street parking and loading spaces

Fences or walls

Flag poles

Gates or guard houses for subdivisions

Guest houses

Home barbeque grills

Parabolic and satellite dish-type antennas

Play equipment

Private garages and carports

Servants quarters

Small storage sheds

Solar collectors

Swimming pools

Television and radio receiving antennas less than 50 feet in height

No accessory building or use shall occupy a required front yard (except basketball goals, flag poles and fences as permitted).

A hobby activity may be operated as an accessory use by the occupant of the premises purely for personal enjoyment, amusement or recreation.

B. Home occupations such as, but not limited to, the following:

Accountant Architect Artist Attorney Author or writer Chiropractor Clergyman Cosmetologist Counselor Dentist Engineer Home crafts Insurance Agent Osteopath Photographer Physician Planner Real Estate Agent Salesman Seamstress/Dressmaker Secretary/Typist

Teaching or instruction provided not more than 3 students are taught at any one time and not more than 12 students per day

The following conditions and restrictions shall apply to such customary home occupations:

- That the home occupations shall be carried on wholly within a main building or structure, or within a permitted accessory building or structure, provided that the primary use of the main building or structure is clearly the dwelling used by the person as his or her private residence.
- 2. That no person other than members of the household living on the premises and one (1) outside person shall be employed.
- That only one nonilluminated ground or wall sign not more than 4 square feet in area is used to advertise the home occupation.
- 4. That no display or storage of equipment or materials outside of a building or structure shall be permitted.
- 5. That no equipment or machine is used in such activities that is perceptible off the premises by reason of noise, smoke, dust, odor, heat, glare, radiation, electrical interference or vibration.
- 6. That off-street parking and loading shall be provided and that no generation of substantial volumes of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or parking demand shall be permitted.
